Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition

This is the world's oldest international writing competition.

The Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition asks young writers to consider how the Commonwealth can address global challenges and work to create a better future for all its citizens. HRH The Duchess of Cornwall launched the 2020 Competition in New Zealand on the theme of Climate Action and the Commonwealth; drawing on the increasing youth movement across the Commonwealth and the ongoing climate crisis.

Young people are called upon to use any form of creative writing to consider their position and power in bringing about change, and how the Commonwealth can be used as a tool for positive action. In 2019 more than 11,000 students entered the competition from across 48 Commonwealth countries but less than 300 entries came from the United Kingdom. resources (including a [promotional flyer](#)) and full details are available [on the RCS website](#).



The Competition is valuable not only in promoting the value of the Commonwealth, it is also a unique chance for young people to develop creative writing and written English skills and share their views and experiences with a global audience. It has the full support of its Patron, Her Majesty the Queen, who is represented by HRH The Duchess of Cornwall at the annual awards ceremony celebrating the Winners' achievements. Entries will be accepted through the online platform until 30 June 2020.

With no time to lose.


Turning, swirling, pounding,
