Google Classroom

The staff have had training this week in the use of google classroom. They will be working with the children to log into their google classroom account over the next week. Login details and instructions on how to use google classroom will also be sent home. This will be used as a way of setting work and providing feedback if we have to have a local lockdown or if a class need to stay at home and isolate. To help the staff and children become more familiar with the new technology, some homework will be set via google classroom after half term. This doesn't mean that the homework will need to be completed on a computer - the instructions will be sent via google classroom and there are various ways for the work to be sent back electronically. <u>Please do complete the survey that was emailed last Friday to help us understand how parents are able to access any remote learning.</u>

These tests are: SATs in year 2 and year 6; the Multiplication Tables Check in year 4 and the Phonics Check in year 1. The Phonics Check is now also being given to current year 2s who missed it in the Summer term. They will sit it in the second half of this term.
