#### **Christmas Fair**

It will soon be the Christmas Fair and there are various ways in which we need your help. Next Friday, the children can come to school in non-school uniform in return for a donation of a prize for either an adult or child tombola. Most importantly we still need your help to run the stalls. Currently we hope to have 6 different things on offer and there are only 4 people to run them. If we don't have some voulunteers we will have to reduce what is on offer. In turn this will reduce the amount of money we make. Currently "The Friend's of Boxgrove School" are spending more money each year than they make. Without this money, we won't be able to offer some of the trips and experiences that we do currently, such as theatre trips, Christmas and Easter treats and providing new equipment for the school, such as replacing broken sheds. #### Spelling Log books

Children from year 2 upwards should now be bringing home a spelling log book. Each week your child will be adding words that match the spelling pattern they are learning in their group as well as the focus 'red/orange' words. Do read the advice and notes on pages 4 and 5 to help you and your child get the best from using the log book to help them practice. Children need their books in school everyday. Please encourage and support them at home with learning these words. Children take part in low stakes quizzes on Mondays and Fridays in their spelling groups and we are looking for evidence that spellings are learnt when they use them in their writing.

#### **Supporting Reading in School**

Reading is a skill we continue to develop throughout our lives, but starting this process as early as possible has significant benefits for our continued success as readers. This is why, as parents and carers, you play a vital role in supporting your child in becoming a fluent reader who is confidently able to apply their reading skills across all areas of their lives. The teaching of reading and reading comprehension within the classroom is only part of a child's learning, and the value that is given to reading at home is equally important. Research suggests that children who read regularly outside of school perform significantly better in school assessments and so your support at home is essen-



tial in ensuring that your child makes the progress they are capable of. You can help your child to achieve their full potential by listening to them read daily, reading regular bedtime stories and by encouraging them to enjoy reading and sharing books together. Reading widely through all of these approaches will also help develop your child's vocabulary, which in turn will make them more confident when reading more challenging books.

We know that some children find reading more challenging than others and not all children read at home regularly and so we are keen to build up our bank of volunteers who come into school to hear children read. If you can (or if you think you might be able to) offer 10 minutes two or three times a week perhaps at the start of the day or just before the end of the day to listen to a child read, we'd like to invite you to come and have a cup of tea or coffee and a piece of cake with us on <u>Tuesday 29th November at 2.30pm</u> and find out more about what is involved. Coming to the meeting doesn't commit you to anything!

We want the children to be able to ask and answer scientific questions about the world around them. When planning for the science curriculum, we intend for children to have the opportunity, wherever possible, to learn through varied investigations.

<u>Owl Class</u> have been learning about what material is best for making a lunch box by investigating which material kept the ice cube cold the best.

## Owl Class Science Challenge


They have been set a challenge for Monday. They need to bring in a regular sized ice cube (this can be made by freezing a small amount of water in a plastic bag) wrapped in two layers of a material of their choosing. In can be placed in a pot for the journey to school. They will all be put on a tray together in the same place in the classroom. Mrs Pendle has offered 5 house team point counters to the winner - the person whose ice cube melts last!!



<u>Fox Class</u> have been investigating the effect of different liquids on our teeth. They placed eggs in a variety of liquids and observed what happened to the eggs over time and thought about what this would mean for

our teeth.





<u>Squirrel Class</u> have been finding out about living things. They have had several animal visitors and have thought about what they need to survive.








### Support Freya with her 5km run

## **Support with the Cost of Living**

The County Council is using its £4.8 million Household Support Fund, from Government, to provide a package of financial and practical assistance to people this winter. Working closely with district and borough councils and charities to get help to those most in need. Their Community Hub will continue to offer direct support to vulnerable households, providing essentials such as food and supplies, as well as grants to those who are eligible. The 36 West Sussex libraries will also offer a warm welcome to all visitors. Friendly library staff will be on hand to help and advise people on a range of topics, from money management to energy saving, job seeking and benefits guidance. Regular library events like Story Time are free for families of young children. On their 'Here to help - Cost of living' webpages, you can find lots of practical advice and information about how to apply for extra local and national support. Over the Christmas school holiday, the Council will again be running its Holiday Activities and Food programme for children who receive benefits-related free school meals. Over the summer, 2,395 eligible children took part, and this Christmas they will be offering a range of free holiday club places where all children will be given a nutritious meal. More information will be shared once it is available.
