

The Blue Letter: 10th July 2020



Dear Parents/Carers ,

It hardly seems possible that we have one week of this school year left. Well done to all those families who have continued to follow the home learning - you are amazing!

If you are a family who has borrowed a school laptop, can I ask you to return it before the end of term please.

The school reports have been either sent home with your child or posted directly to you. Please can you either send back the reply slip or email us to let us know you have received it.

If your child will be in Year 1 or 2 in September please make sure you have replied to the email about school meals. Thank to those of you who have replied already.

We have been working hard this week on our plans for September. As you know, in September, school will be compulsory for all . There will be limited social distancing in classes but classes will be kept separate from each other as recommended by the government. Below are some extra details which will help us do this:

- Gates will be opened at 8.35am and close at 8.50am for all children.
- Squirrel class will enter and exit through the car park gate.
- Parents of children in year 1 and 2 are asked to drop their children at the gate rather than come to the classroom.
- Fox class will enter and exit through the side gate as usual; parents are asked to say goodbye at the main gate.
- Owl class will enter and exit via the main door and again parents are asked to say goodbye at the gate.
- Please try as much as possible to minimise the number of people who come to drop off and collect children. This helps us to minimise the number of people who are waiting around on the pavement at the start and end of the day. It makes it easier for adults to keep distance and is more considerate for people who need to walk past school.
- Children will continue to eat their lunch in their classrooms and have separate playtimes and lunchtimes for each class -there will be no whole school activities.
- We will return to sending books and reading records between home and school.
- We will continue to ask children to come to school in PE kits on PE days. This means we don't need to have PE kits in school.

Finally, a reminder that our Leavers' Service from Church will be streamed live on the Boxgrove Priory facebook page on Friday 17th July at 2.30pm. We know there is space in church for one parent to attend with each year 6 child. We are waiting for confirmation to see if this can be increased to two adults per year 6 child. Full details of all year 6 activities next week will be sent home with your child on Monday.


Summer Reading Bingo
